The West Virginia University Extension Service works to provide solutions in your community through key programs and resources, including agriculture and natural resources; 4-H and youth development; food and nutrition; health and wellness; financial planning; and home gardening. These research-based programs and services are available to Wood County residents thanks to the tremendous support of our community members, local organizations, volunteers and local partners, including the Board of Education and County Commission.

Highlights

- 3,500+ youths and 700+ adults served.
- \$400,000+ generated by involvement in WVU Extension Service educational programming.
- More than **20,000** volunteer hours (\$544,000 value) provided to our local community.
- Faculty members authored columns, articles, and social media posts to share research and offer practical advice for parents, farmers and community members reaching more than **475,000** people.

4-H and Youth Development

Camping

- 104 youths and 55 volunteers participated in Wood County's summer day camping programs.
- \$1,000 was secured from Health Rocks® grant to provide outdoor recreation activities at 4-H camps.
- \$1,000 was secured from National 4-H Council to assist in a state mental health conference for teens in WV.
- 23 Wood County 4-H members participated in state and national 4-H camps/leadership events.
- \$200,000 in grants and donations successfully secured for Wood County 4-H Camp facility upgrades.

In-School Enrichment Programs

- 2,500 middle-school youths participated **in school-based educational programs** focused on lessons related to healthy living, substance abuse prevention, community service, and citizenship.
- 55 middle school students participated in Career Readiness, a 9-week curriculum focused on career exploration.
- 208 elementary school youth participated in STEM activities and learned about chicken embryology.
- 98 middle and high school youth from 7 county region learned how to stay connected during the pandemic.
- 6 middle school counselors were trained in *Botvin Life Skills* a middle school life skills education curriculum.

Traditional 4-H Programming and Clubs

- 245 youths participated in 4-H Clubs.
- 16 teen leaders completed leadership training, projects and gained career skills by serving as camp counselors.
- 543 youths received DIY take-home STEM activity kits and lessons.
- 68 still projects were exhibited locally, and 58 blue ribbon projects were exhibited at the State Fair of WV.
- 122 volunteers were trained in youth protection, financial best practices, and COVID safety.
- 29 youth participated in 4-H GEM program and learned mindfulness and stress reduction strategies.
- 65 youth participated in state WV 4-H Pen Pal program and learned letter writing and communication skills.
- 33 youth and 37 adults participated in **4-H** *Career Readiness* workshops and learned how to match 4-H activities to future career interests.
- 116 youth and 45 volunteers participated in the first Wood County 4-H and FFA Summer Showcase.

Energy Express Summer Reading Program: secured \$22,000 for a program that provided summer employment and college scholarships to 5 college students and one teacher. 23 youth participants received two nutritious meals daily – 87% of students eligible for free/reduced lunch. 73% of students improved or maintained reading skills. 13 volunteers served 539 hours.

Financial Literacy: 29 students at Jackson Middle School learned about money management through NextGen Finance.

Family Nutrition Program

Youth Program

- 14 students participated in 6-week virtual series of Teen Cuisine focused on Nutrition education.
- 103 students from Jefferson and Madison Elementary Schools learned about Rethink Your Drink.
- 342 students from area schools and the YMCA learned Show Me Nutrition.
- 30 received Microgreen kits at Children's Home Society.
- 8 students from VanDevender Middle School learned nutritious cooking skills.
- **Pop-up Farmers' Markets** provided fresh produce to 796 students at Kanawha, Martin Elementary, YMCA, the Boys and Girls Club, and the Wood County 4-H and FFA Summer Showcase. Grants to support program received from Parkersburg Area Community Foundation (\$6,750) and Sister's Health Foundation (\$4,000).
- 60 students participated in Food of the Month and Grow This at Franklin and Martin Elementary Schools.
- 12 students at Martin Elementary School Energy Express learned nutrition education.
- Grow This seed kits were mailed to approximately 900 households regionally (500 in Wood County).
- 116 youth at the Wood County 4-H and FFA Summer Showcase learned Rethink Your Drink.
- 104 youth learned healthy snack alternatives at Wood County 4-H summer camps.

Adult Program

- 5 virtual Eat Smart Be Active classes 28 adult participants learned about nutrition and fitness.
- 2 in-person Eat Smart Be Active classes 17 adult participants learned about nutrition and fitness.
- 2 virtual Families Cook with Teen Cuisine classes 4 Families 4 Adults and 9 children learned how to cook nutritious meals together.
- Partnered with Coplin Health Services to offer **FARMacy** in 4 counties. Instructed classes in Wood, Wirt, Jackson, and Roane counties.
- Participated in the Grow This West Virginia Program, mailing out seed packets to participants in 5 counties.
- Partnered with agencies to provide a Farmers Market in Vienna. Provided food demonstrations and resources.
- Trained to provide the **CARDIAC Program** to schools in Wood and Wirt counties in 2022. Program will check Kindergarten, second and fifth grade student's height, weight, and Acanthosis nigricans screening.

Wood County Extension faculty and staff worked together to provide programming to thousands of residents in the county during the pandemic. Faculty and staff continued to serve on numerous community coalitions and committees providing support and local expertise. Faculty also contributed to state and national research projects that guided their work in the community and served on state and national committees tackling issues like diabetes education, youth life skills, workforce development, diversity and inclusion, gardening and horticulture, substance abuse prevention, and healthy living. Programs were delivered in-person when permitted and virtually.

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
