At 9:50 a.m. the Commission witnessed the swearing in of Mr. Oney J. Gabbert as Deputy Sheriff for the Wood County Sheriff's Department.

At 10:07 a.m. the Commission met with Dr. William D Staats, President of the Board of Education and members of the The purpose of the meeting was to submit a written Board. request for Assessment Rate Increase. Mrs. Wilma Beckett (member of the Board) addressed the Commission by stating that the finances of the Board of Education were erroding each and every year as prices for supplies has excalated. Mrs. Beckett went on to say that the County Commission was the only area that was available to approach for funding assistance. Commission President Holmes P. Shaver asked the group what amount of funding would be needed. Dr. Staats commented that anything above and beyond what they were presently recieving would be of help. Ar. Staats further commented that they would need \$1,281,912.00 to come-up to the state average. The Commission also asked Mr. Staats, if he would be receiving any additional funding assistance from the Dr. Staats, stated that they would receive nothing in Commissioner excess above and beyond what had been allocated. Parrish, questioned the group as to what part of their budget additional funding would be applied to. Dr. Staats, stated that

it would be used throughout the budget. Mr. Eugene Knotts,
Assessor also in attendance at the meeting stated that the
Commission would need to make a decision in relation to the
request for assessment rate increase within the next two (2) days
The Commission stated that they would certainly consider their
request. A copy of this request is in attachment.

At 11:02 a.m. the Commission met with Mr. Lawrence Ronning - Attorney for Mountwood Park, Mr. Ed Lehew, Director of Mountwood Park, and Mr. Mike Matheny, member of the Mountwood Board. The purpose of the meeting was to discuss and review with the Commission a meeting with Mr. Pat Flemming from Washing. ton, D.C. Mr. Lehew explained the need to employ an expert to put together a funding feasability study as to whether or not the lodge is a feasable money making project for the park. Mr. Lehew stated that the cost would not exceed \$4,000.00, to do the study. Mr. Ronning stated that E.D.A. had informed them that they would have sixty (60) days to file the application, and then there would be another waiting period on the grant. Mr. Matheny interjected that they would be under notobligation to pay for any thing other than the study. Mr. Matheny went on to say that they would rely on private funding sources for the balance they might have to get funding secured. Commissioner Shaver, stated that they would discuss the matter and get back with them.

Also, This day, the Wood County Commission, unanimously approved the proposed use of Revenue Sharing Funds, Entitlement XII, covering the period from October 1, 1980, thru September 30, 1981, in the total amount of \$656,928,00. A break down of line

items and the amount committed is attached hereto, and made a part of this ORDER, by reference.
