On this date, the County Commission of Wood County met in regular session. They signed purchase orders, invoices and other correspondence.

On this date, the County Commission approved Erroneous Assessment Applications in regard to Personal Property for Terry D. & Robert E. Fouss, II - Vienna District (1995 & 1996).

At 10:00 A.M., the County Commission met with Fred Krieg, Judge Jeffrey Reed, Ginny Conley and Carol Barth to discuss funding for the Y.I.E.L.D. Program. A handout in regard to this matter is attached to these minutes.

At 11:00 A.M., the County Commission held a hearing in regard to the Robert L. Caplinger estate. Attorney Robert Full was present. Mr. Full asked that due to the fact that this may have been a wrongful death, he would like to keep this estate open. Jamie Six, Clerk said he didn't see a problem with doing this. The County Commission, upon a motion made by Robert K. Tebay, seconded by David A. Couch and made unanimous by Holmes R. Shaver, approved Mr. Full's request to keep the Robert L. Caplinger estate open.

At 2:00 P.M., the County Commission met with Janelle Burwell from the Mid-Ohio Valley Regional Council to discuss the Lubeck Public Service District - LMH/Hopewell water extension project. On this date, the County Commission of Wood County, upon a motion made by David A. Couch, seconded by Robert K. Tebay and made unanimous by Holmes R. Shaver, did hereby EXECUTE a Resolution in which it is resolved that Holmes R. Shaver, in his official capacity as


President and on behalf of the County Commission, is hereby AUTHORIZED to request Small Cities Block Grant funds by executing Drawdown Number Three (3) to pay invoices presented to the said County Commission in regard to the Lubeck Public Service District - LMH/Hopewell Water Extension Project. Invoices presented to the said County Commission were from Stonegate Construction, Inc., Belpre, Ohio in the amount of One Hundred Five Thousand Five Hundred Eighteen Dollars and Fifty-Nine cents (\$105,518.59) and from Yeneka Construction, Morristown, Ohio in the amount of One Hundred Five Thousand Four Hundred Fifty-Seven Dollars and Fifty-One Cents (\$105,457.51). Documentation in regard to the aforementioned Small Cities Block Grant is on file in the Office of the County Administrator. An Order was prepared regarding this matter.

On this date, came Ginny Conley, Prosecuting Attorney for Wood County, and presented to the County Commission of Wood County an application in which it is requested that the Honorable Cecil H. Underwood, Governor of the State of West Virginia, issue a requisition on the Governor of Tennessee for the extradition of Lee A. Davis, who stands charged with the crime of Fraudulent Scheme, committed in the County of Wood, State of West Virginia, in June, 1996, and as the Prosecuting Attorney is informed, is now within the jurisdiction of the said State of Tennessee, in the County of Marion and in the City of Jasper. Upon a motion made by David A. Couch, seconded by Robert K. Tebay and passed, the County Commission of Wood County did hereby AUTHORIZE Holmes R. Shaver, in his official capacity as President and on behalf of the County Commission, to sign the said Application for extradition. An Order was prepared regarding this matter.


Having no further scheduled appointments or business to attend to, the County Commission adjourned at 4:00 P.M.



Y.I.E.L.D.

The Youth In Effective Legal Diversion Program is a community based program of intervention with youths (age 13 years through 17 years), who have been charged with a status or misdemeanor offense. The purpose of the program is to work with youths and their families to deal with parent/child conflict and to deter further delinquent conduct. The cooperation of all law enforcement agencies, the Prosecuting Attorney's office, the Juvenile Probation Office, schools, the offices of Fred Jay Krieg, Ph.D. & Associates, and families have made this a very successful program.

The Y.I.E.L.D. Program has been in operation since January 1995. The funding since that time has been from the Division of Highway Safety. The funds have been from the federal office of Juvenile Justice Delinquency Prevention. Funding for such programs are available for a three year period of time to implement and assess the program to determine its success rate. Once the three year cycle has expired, it is expected that community resources will support the program if it has proven to be successful.

Youth who are charged with a delinquency complaint are required to appear at the Juvenile Probation Office for an assessment to determine if they are appropriate for the program. Once accepted into the program, the youth and parents are required to attend an Orientation meeting in Judge Reed's court room. At that time, representatives from the Prosecuting Attorney's office, the Juvenile Probation Office, and Dr. Krieg's office present an outline of the Juvenile Justice process, discuss the aspects of Juvenile Probation that is imposed on the youth and his parents, and the counseling program for the youth and parents offered through Dr. Krieg's office. The youth attend eight group counseling sessions, and the parents attend three group counseling sessions.

Since the program began, there have been 157 youths and families participate in the program. Of those 157 youths, 35 have committed other offenses causing them to be processed in formal Court proceedings. Of those 35 youths, 12 failed to successfully complete the program. Of the 35 youths charged with new offenses, 8 have been charged with felony offenses. The other 27 youths have been charged with status offenses or misdemeanor offenses. The success of the program is evident.
